Quality out-of-school time programs offer expanded learning opportunities to thousands of kids across Kentucky and are a lifeline for working parents, but more families than ever are being left out.

In Kentucky, for every child enrolled in an out-ofschool time program, four more are waiting to get in, leaving many kids alone and unsupervised when school is not in session.¹

Save the Children

In addition to providing afterschool programming to school-age students in eastern Kentucky, Save the Children is also helping curb hunger for children and families all across the Commonwealth. Over the past year, Save the Children has delivered more than 2,500 boxes containing fresh and nutritious fruits, vegetables, dairy products, and meat, along with over 2,500 gallons of milk to families who need it most. For families without reliable transportation to distribution sites, Save the Children staff have banded together with local school and community partners to arrange at-home deliveries. "I don't think I've ever seen happier boys!" said one community partner reflecting on this program.
